A look at the costs and considerations of the events we love

WC members are looking forward to seven exciting events for the 2024–2025 season. They include the Fall Welcome in early September, the Scholarship Luncheon in October and a Holiday Celebration in December. And, as always, we will have three Conversation luncheons—in November, February and April—followed by the Annual



A lot of consideration goes into the planning and pricing of events such as the Fall Welcome Reception, enjoyed last year by Diane Young and Val Wolff.

Meeting in May.

Venues this year include Midland Hills and DoubleTree Hotel by Hilton, both in Roseville, Norway House in Minneapolis, and Como Conservatory and Town & Country in St. Paul.

How does the UMWC determine how much to ask members to pay for each event? Each option has its own unique costs such as room rental, food and beverage costs (for example \$18–\$23 for a lunch), service charges (20–25%), state and city sales tax and rental costs for such items as podiums, microphones, projectors and screens, even a piano and table linens.

Other considerations include easy and inexpensive parking, venue locations around the Twin Cities, a variety of food options, adding in a little fun, and reasonable food and beverage minimums. This last item is important in the final amount to charge if member participation is low for an event. We have seen lunch prices increase this past year as well as increases to the food and beverage minimums. We also have had decreasing support from external sources for our December event. To save on expenses, we are trying out breakfast/brunch menus for two events this year, the Fall Welcome and the December event.

Finally, this year the Finance Committee made a recommendation, which the Board approved, to provide funds to subsidize the program expenditures to keep prices for members the same as last year, with the exception of asking members to pay \$20 for the Fall Welcome Reception. This amount will not cover all those event costs. Since the subsidy, which is coming from member dues, cannot continue long term, look for changes coming in 2025–2026.

Writing is a friend and mentor I can no longer do without

When you ask Judy McConnell about her writing she will tell you, "It's a love story." But she's also the first to admit it's a story with a few fits and starts. And the product of a long and interesting life.

Born in West Virginia, Judy was the middle child of three, with an older brother and younger sister. Her father, the oldest of seven children, was the first in his family to graduate from college. An ambitious man, he earned an undergraduate degree from the University of West Virginia and then went to Harvard. Following graduation, he got a job with the Securities and Exchange Commission and later accepted a position at Investors Diversified Services (IDS).

The IDS job landed the family in Minnesota, where they lived first in Golden Valley's Tyrol Hills and then Kenwood in Minneapolis. Judy attended what was then Northrop Collegiate High School, now the Blake School. After graduating, Judy spent a year at the University of Colorado-Boulder. "I didn't like it," she said. "I wasn't in a sorority and just didn't fit in." She did, however, make a good friend from Los Angeles who was an artist and together they enrolled in the University of Southern California, where Judy received a degree in Comparative Literature and a minor in Cinema.

"I knew I didn't want to a secretary, nurse or teacher, which were the options for women at that time," Judy said. She also didn't want to stay in California and moved back to Minnesota, but soon decided to try her luck in New York City.

She describes the experience of job hunting in New York in her second book *Just Keep Shooting*.

"Every day I folded myself inside the red phone booth on a nearby street corner, classifieds in my lap, a coin purse full of dimes, and dialed call after call.... I experienced an unreal feeling of being caged in a small boat in a stormy sea.... The coins kept slipping from my wet fingers and the phone receiver, propped by one shoulder, rubbed like pumice against my chin. It was like shooting an arrow over a dark ocean, each rejection a shaft of hope disappearing into the fog. Just keep shooting."

Eventually, Judy's minor in Cinema landed her a job in the United Nation's film department, where she diligently saved her money for a trip to France. She lived there for nine months to study the language and bum around Europe.

Meanwhile, Judy and three women friends rented a small house for the summer in South Hampton. The very first weekend, the women attended a party hosted by nine young men, graduate law students who had rented their own enormous summer home. Judy spent the entire evening—and many evenings after that—sitting at the piano singing and turning pages for the piano player. "And that's how I met Dave McConnell," she said. He'd just received a law degree from Fordham University. They eventually married and moved to California, where Dave had a job and they soon had two children.

It wasn't long before the couple realized "we really missed our New York friends," Judy said, and they moved back to New York. But her husband was seeking a new job and when Judy's father introduced him to a contact at General Mills in Minneapolis, the couple moved with their two children back to Minnesota, where Dave took up a new position with General Mills.

"And that's where I've been ever since," Judy said. She and Dave eventually divorced. "I've been single for quite a few years but we remained friends."

Newly divorced with two children, Judy went back to school, earning degrees at the University of Minnesota in French and education. She taught French for two years and then went back to the U to become certified as a training specialist. In that role she worked at Shriners Hospital and Group Health, "putting together programs for new supervisory employees, teaching them effective management techniques," she explained.

When she retired, she started writing again. "I'd kind of forgotten about writing," Judy said. "I'd done it off and on when I was young but not for a long time." The kids were gone and she wanted something "meaty" to do but it was an experience at her lake home that got the ball rolling.

After deciding to add 15 feet to her cabin, she hired a construction crew who irked her to no end with their construction lingo and inability to communicate. "And they would put nothing down on paper," Judy said. "It made me so frustrated."

So frustrated that she decided to write about it. A friend read the short piece and said, "This is really good."

"I could get into this," thought Judy. And so began an effort that has resulted in four books: *A Penny A Kiss*, which describes her childhood in Minneapolis; *Just Keep*

Shooting, a narrative of her time in New York; *Dreamhouse*, a book of fiction loosely based on her marriage during the

upheavals of the seventies; and *The Night Owl Sings*, a fictional collection of short stories about the bumps and pleasures of growing older.

With *Dreamhouse*, she switched from memoir to fiction but believes everything is based on personal experiences. "I start with an idea that grabs me, often based on my own life," Judy said. "Eighty percent of writing is revision. You have to add characters and a plot line." In the beginning she spent four to five hours a day writing at the Shoreview Library, sitting with her face to the wall to avoid distraction. She took classes at The Loft Literary Center to hone her craft. And she hired editors along the way. "You really need a professional editor," she said.

But mostly writing is long, hard work, according to Judy. Her latest book, for example, took four years. "You have to really be diligent to get through the hard times."

Other activities fill her days as well. Her son and daughter live in the greater metropolitan area with their families and she enjoys spending time with them. She still loves to sing and participates in a community chorale. She plays bridge and board games. And she greatly appreciates UMWC, which she joined in 2005 at the invitation of Ingrid Lund, a long-time friend and NYC roommate. She participates in the Hikers, Bridge and Modern Literature interest sections, and last year she launched a new interest group called The Creative Writers Circle.

"I love how friendly, educated and intelligent everyone is," Judy says about the club. And, needless to say, she's delighted to share her writing with UMWC members. "I'll meet you to save you the cost of postage," she says of getting her books out there. To learn more about her writing, go to her website at www.agreatbook.net.

As Judy explained in a recent article for *Women's Press* magazine, "Writing is a friend and mentor I can no longer do without. Where there had been a vacant space at my side, there is now an intimation of a presence, a force that accompanies me everywhere. Life is good."


